Over the past several months, we have experienced an exciting revival in all areas of our business, including how we communicate to our valued clients. This is reflected in the new Source, which is an enhanced communication tool to elevate, promote, and share more vividly all that Inframark does.

Sharing our story via the Source is going to be fun and rewarding because there's a lot of good happening in our midst that's worth celebrating and sharing with everyone. It's indeed an exciting time for us, and I couldn't be more proud of our team as we embark on a new chapter of our journey — and we are pleased that you are along for the ride!

Now, let's have a glance at our recent performance.

Our revenue continues to track above plan, driven by strong contract retention and additional billable work in the Municipal Utility

Districts (MUDs) and Contract Operations (Con Ops) divisions.

Against prior year, revenue is 11% higher — primarily driven by new business. Our financial year just closed in March and the overall outlook is positive, underpinned by the continued efforts of the MUDs post-Harvey. We successfully retained 19 of our contracts up for renewal, putting us at a 95% renewal rate for 2017.

Houston travels the "MUD" dy road to inventory success

Two years ago, we began implementing Inventory Management within the Municipal Utility Districts (MUDs) in Houston, Texas. This would mean utilizing two systems (with different part numbers), hiring a new team, organizing and creating efficient warehouses (three of them), creating visibility of materials, creating processes and procedures, training the inventory team and operational staff, receiving employee buy-in and, most importantly, showing value.

The first year was a whirlwind of activity while we established the visibility we would need to run the analytics. During this period, we set up warehouses, identified materials, reorganized

materials numerous times, established issue point procedures (to include after-hours), created new vendor relationships, and established new Inventory Control procedures.

The start of the second year was dedicated to fine-tuning the system while we utilized the data to help drive value to the MUDs. This led to new reorder points, an upgraded system for inventory control clerks, weekly adjustments, bin management, a dramatic increase in accuracy, a decrease in unidentified transactions (also known as UFOs), and a reduction of material expense without business interference.


The Results

Recently, we concluded our year-end, wall-to-wall inventory and the results have been the best recorded in our company's history:

- A 16% decrease in materials on hand at warehouses (\$103,709).
- A 99% average accuracy in warehouse audits for controlled sites (Westmoor was voted the best warehouse in terms of accuracy, cleanliness, and organization).
- A 97% average accuracy in vehicle audits

 (ARS was voted the best vehicle audit in terms of accuracy, cleanliness and organization).
- The ability to identify slow-moving materials with accuracy.
- Enhanced customer satisfaction.

As you can see, it's been a great year. As we look forward to next year, we will continue to improve the value for our teams and our clients!

was the first representative of Inframark to be


elected by fellow business peers of Plaquemines




